# For the week of the Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost August 28<sup>th</sup> through September 4<sup>th</sup>, 2022

Catechesis Notes for the Week — The Third and Fourth Commandments — "God's Good Gifts of His Word and Authority" "I can be a Christian without going to Church." How often are statements like these spoken to excuse a lack of church attendance? Yet God commands, "Remember the Sabbath Day by keeping it holy." Or, if you'd prefer, from Hebrews, "Let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near." Luther speaks in the Small Catechism that God's Word is what makes something holy. So to keep a day holy, we fill it with God's Word. What's more, the "sabbath" is honored with rest. We as Christians know our rest is found in Jesus. We receive His rest through His gifts of Word and Sacrament. He promises to distribute these gifts through His appointed servants (pastors) at Church. No, going to Church does not make you Christian, but Christians go to Church. They go because it is there they receive God's gifts of forgiveness, salvation, and eternal life. And it is there that God gives His servant to distribute His gifts faithfully. A pastor's authority is not for his own benefit, but for yours. God wants to give you His gifts, so He tells you where to find them. Come, receive.

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate.

Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

The Third Commandment? Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy.	Preschool+
What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word, but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it.	Second Grade+
The Fourth Commandment? Honor your father and your mother.	Preschool+
What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not despise or anger our parents and other authorities, but honor them, serve and obey them, love and cherish them.	First Grade+

Heavenly Father, from whom all fatherhood on earth is given: give to us gratitude for the gifts of parents and others in authority and the humility to serve, obey, love, and cherish them as they fulfill the duties and responsibilities You have assigned to them in this life; through Your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

#### Collect for Life as a Baptized Child of God

Merciful Father, through Holy Baptism You called us to be Your own possession. Grant that our lives may evidence the working of Your Holy Spirit in love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control, according to the image of Your only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior. Amen.

## Collect of the Day for the martyrdom of St. John the Baptist

Almighty God, You gave your servant John the Baptist to be the forerunner of Your Son, Jesus Christ, in both his preaching of repentance and his innocent death. Grant that we, who have died and risen with Christ in Holy Baptism, may daily repent of our sins, patiently suffer for the sack of the truth, and fearlessly bear witness to His victory over death; through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Sunday: For the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word

and Sacrament.

Monday: For faith to live in the promises of Holy Baptism; for one's calling and daily work; for

alone; for our communities and neighborhoods.

Thursday: For the Church and her pastors; for teachers, deaconesses, and other church

workers; for missionaries and for all who serve the Church; for fruitful and salutary

use of the blessed Sacrament of Christ's body and blood.

Friday: For the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His

knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the

sick and dying.

Saturday: For faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or

have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day;

for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.

# <u>Looking Forward to "Father, Forgive Them"</u>

August 28, 2022

Genesis 50:15-21—Joseph forgives his brothers for selling him into slavery. He acknowledges that they weren't in their right mind and didn't understand the evil they committed against him. Even so, though they meant to harm him, God used Joseph's suffering for his good, and even the good of his whole family.

1 John 1:1-2:6—If we believe and act as if we have no sin, then our sin will be held against us. But if we acknowledge before God and man that we are sinners in need of mercy, then the blood of Christ cleanses us from all sin and we have fellowship with God and one another.

**Luke 23:33-34**—Hanging from the cross, Jesus takes the sin of the world upon Himself and cries out, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."
