For the week of the Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost September 11th through September 18th, 2022

Catechesis Notes for the Week — "God's Good Gifts of Possessions and Reputation" Notice how the fourth, fifth, and sixth commandments sort of form a groundwork for the family? They give and protect the gifts of parenthood, life, and marriage. But how are a husband and wife to provide for and protect this new family that God has given? After all, we are not solely spiritual creatures without any needs of the body. In order to care for the body we need money and possessions. I need a house to shelter my family, clothing to put on their bodies, food to put in their bellies, transportation to get them places. And of course, I need money in order to purchase these things for them. Therefore God protects the gifts that He gives for me to care for my family with His commandment, "You shall not steal." Of course, in order for me to obey this commandment and not steal what God has given to others, I must earn money to purchase what we need. In order to do that I need to have a job, and in order to have a good job I need a good reputation in the community. Therefore, God even protects my reputation, with His command, "You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor. And He requires me to protect the reputation of others. After all, we are meant to live as family, not only in our individual families, but as a family together with other families in the name of Christ. Let us honor the seventh and eighth commandments.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate.

Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

The Seventh Commandment You shall not steal.	Preschool+
What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.	First Grade+
The Eighth Commandment You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.	Preschool+
What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.	Second Grade+

Instead, give us cheerful hearts and willing hands to help our neighbors improve and protect their livelihood; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Prayer on the Eighth Commandment:

Guard our lips, O Lord, and govern our unruly tongues so that our words about our neighbors are not tainted with falsehood, betrayal, or slander, which would damage their reputation. Instead, give us the wisdom to speak well of our neighbors, defend them, and explain their circumstances and actions in the kindest way; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Collect of the Week

O God, Your almighty power is made known chiefly in showing mercy. Grant us the fullness of Your grace that we may be called to repentance and made partakers of Your heavenly treasures; through Your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Holy Cross Day

Merciful God, Your Son, Jesus Christ, was lifted high upon the cross that He might bear the sins of the world and draw all people to Himself. Grant that we who glory in His death for our redemption may faithfully heed His call to bear the cross and follow Him, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Looking Forward to "Proclaiming the Lord's Death"

September 18, 2022

Exodus 12:21-28—God gives His command and promise of eating the Passover lamb. Anyone who trusts the Word of the Lord concerning the blood of the lamb and does as He commands will be delivered from death and saved from bondage of the house of Egypt. This celebration of the Passover would be observed as a remembrance to teach the coming generations of what all God had done for His people.

1 Corinthians 11:23-34—Paul instructs the Corinthians concerning the Lord's Supper. He is only teaching them what Christ Himself had taught. When we gather at the Lord's table it is both intimately personal and publicly corporate. We receive the very body and blood of Jesus upon our lips, but as we do so we make common confession with those we are communing with of who Jesus is and of the salvation He gives. When we fail to discern the body, both the body of Christ in the Supper and the Body of Christ gathered for the Supper, then we are actually eating and drinking to our own judgement and are condemned along with the world. Therefore Paul exhorts that no one come to the table without discernment and understanding, as individuals who are part of the Church.

John 6:43-69—The words of Jesus were simply too hard for people to receive. They were not rational. "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" When we place our reason over the revelation of God's Word, we are going to not only misunderstand the faith, we are going to misunderstand Jesus Himself. So the people turned away from following Jesus. Instead, we approach Jesus with our reason in submission to His revelation. Jesus says that we must receive His body and blood in order to have eternal life. This is not only true in a spiritual sense, but just as God commanded Israel to feast upon the flesh of the Passover lamb we too are to feast upon the flesh of Jesus. We do so through the Lord's Supper. But how are the flesh and blood of Jesus in the bread and the wine? We don't know. We simply confess, "We believe because Jesus has said it to be so." We confess with the disciples, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life, and we have believe, and have come to know, that you are the Holy One of God."
