Catechesis Notes for the Week — "God's Good Gifts of Contentment" In the Ninth and Tenth commandment, we receive God's gift of contentment. He has given us all things and has not withheld anything from us that we need. Further, we know that God has given our neighbors all that they have. Therefore, we delight ourselves in our gifts and do not even desire what God has given to someone else. It is in these commandments that God really shows that not just our actions, but even our thoughts, emotions, and desires are corrupted by sin. Coveting is the sinful desire to acquire for ourselves anything that does not belong to our neighbor. It is also the desire to draw away from our neighbor for our own benefit anyone who is important to them, such as a source or family member, friend, or employee. When we find ourselves beginning to think that someone has something better than we do, then we must turn back to God and remember that He is the giver of all good gifts and ask Him to help us have contentment.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate.

Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: The Ninth and Tenth Commandments
