# For the week of the Fourth Sunday in Advent December 18th, through December 24th, 2022

Catechesis Notes for the Week — "Enfleshed: The Living Body" "He has made everything beautiful in its time. Also, he has put eternity into man's heart, yet so that he cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end. I perceived that there is nothing better for them than to be joyful and to do good as long as they live; also that everyone should eat and drink and take pleasure in all his toil—this is God's gift to man. I perceived that whatever God does endures forever; nothing can be added to it, nor anything taken from it. God has done it, so that people fear before him." -Ecclesiastes 3:11-14

Death is all that we have ever known. From the time of Adam and Eve, the one experience common to all humanity is death. And yet God did not create our bodies for death. He created us as living bodies, bodies meant to endure with Him forever. Even in this fallen world, eternity is still in the heart of man. God gives us this hope and desire for life to continue on after death. The world that does not know Him looks for this hope in all the wrong places. They seek to prolong their life artificially, or they desire to make a name for themselves that they may live on in the memory of others.

However, we who are established by and fed and nourished on the Word of God will remain as long as His Word remains. That is to say, we will remain forever in everlasting life. Though our bodies will wear out in this life, our spirits will continue to live hidden in Christ. We Christ returns He will bring our spirits with Him, and at His Word our body and soul will reunite, and we will come out of the grave to join Jesus in eternity. This is what God created us for, life with Him. On that Day, death will leave our bodies forever, so that our renewed bodies will be filled with nothing but life and upheld only by the Word of God.

What a great day, when our bodies will be swallowed up by life to be what they were created to be: living bodies!

Readings: Isaiah 52:7-10| Hebrews 1:1-6 (7-12) | John 1:1-14 (15-18)

The Lord sends out His ministers of the Gospel to make disciples "of all the nations," so that "all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God." The Lord has "bared his holy arm" in the incarnate Christ (Is. 52:7, 10). The child in the manger, born of the Virgin Mary, is the very Word of God, the only begotten Son of the Father, "whom he appointed the heir of all things, through whom also he created the world" (Heb. 1:2). As "all things were made through him" (John 1:3), so are all things redeemed and made new in Him. In His body of flesh and blood, we behold "the radiance of the glory of God" (Heb. 1:3), "glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). He dwells among us in peace, that we might have life and light and salvation in Him. For by His Word of the Gospel, we are born again as the children of God, bearing His name and sharing His eternal life.
