Catechesis Notes for the Week — "Absolution Man" It's a bird! It's a plane! It's, Absolution Man! Okay, perhaps that's a bit too much. As you all know, I am no super hero. Those who have gotten to know me on personal level know that there's really not much supper about me. I'm not particularly talented or gifted in anything. I have plenty of struggles. I'm, well, ordinary. But that's exactly who God places into His Office of the Holy Ministry. Why? Precisely because we aren't superheroes.

Pastors aren't called to save anyone, and it's a big problem when they believe they are. Pastors can't get your children miraculously back in church. He can't wave his hand and bring the inactive members back into the Body. He can't reach out and bring in people of the community until our building is busting at the seams. He can't take away your pain and your sorrow. There is one thing, and one thing only that pastors can do.

Pastors are called to bring people to *the* Savior, and to bring the Savior to the people. That is why a seminary professor would call us "Absolution Man." He reminded us that God was sending us out among His people in order to proclaim His Word of forgiveness. I am *Absolution Man* because that alone can I deliver. I have no power but to take what is Christ's and proclaim it to you. I am utterly dependent upon Christ and His Spirit in every aspect of my ministry.

Now, that task requires me to proclaim all of God's Word, both His Law and Gospel. Sometimes it require me to bring you to repentance first. But, my only power, my only tool, is the Word of God. And yet, that's the only thing needed, because in the power there is life. When we come and confess our sins before the Almighty and righteous Judge, that is a terrifying thing. And yet, you are able to do it precisely because you know that God has given you someone to stand before you, hear that sin, and forgive it. In that forgiveness you are brought from death to life. In that forgiveness there is salvation. I do not forgive you on my own account, but on His. And there is nothing more powerful in all creation than His forgiveness.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate.

Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

CATECHISM — Confession and Office of the Keys

What is Confession?	K+	
Confession has two parts. First, that we confess our sins, and second, that we receive absolution, that is, forgiveness, from the pastor as from God Himself, not doubting, but firmly believing that by it our sins are forgiven before God in heaven.		
What sins should we confess?	Second Grade+	
Before God we should plead guilty of all sins, even those we are not aware of, as we do in the Lord's Prayer; but before the pastor we should confess only those sins which we know and feel in our hearts.		
Which are thee?	Third Grade +	
Consider your place in life according to the Ten Commandments: Are you a father, mother, son, daughter, husband, wife, or worker? Have you been disobedient, unfaithful, or lazy? Have you been hot-tempered, rude, or quarrelsome? Have you hurt someone by your words or deeds? Have you stolen, been negligent, wasted anything, or done any harm?

Prayer on the Confession

Lord Jesus Christ, I give You thanks that my sins are forgiven before Your Father in heaven. By the Holy Spirit, give me grace to trust in Your promises and so live in the freedom and peace that You have won for me in Your death and resurrection. **Amen.**

Collect of the Week

Father in heaven, at the Baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River You proclaimed Him Your beloved Son and anointed Him with the Holy Spirit. Make all who are baptized in His name faithful in their calling as Your children and inheritors with Him of everlasting life; through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Monday: For faith to live in the promises of Holy Baptism; for one's calling and daily work; for

Readings: Isaiah 49:1-7 | Psalm 40:1-11 | 1 Corinthians 1:1-9 | John 1:29-42a

"The LORD, the Redeemer of Israel," calls forth "his Holy One" (Is. 49:7), Jesus, the Christ, "from the womb" of His mother (Is. 49:1). The incarnate Son of God is revealed as the Savior, not only for Israel but also "as a light for the nations," whose salvation reaches "to the end of the earth" (Is. 49:6). John came "baptizing with water" (John 1:31) to reveal Jesus as "the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29), and who glorifies His God and Father by His atoning sacrifice upon the cross. When Jesus was baptized in the waters of the Jordan, the Holy Spirit descended "from heaven like a dove" and "remained on him" (John 1:32). By our Baptism, we are anointed by the same Spirit, adopted by God the Father, and "called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 1:9). Therefore, we "are not lacking in any gift," but we can trust Him who promises to sustain us to the end, "guiltless in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 1:7–8).
