## For the week of the Second Sunday in Lent March 5<sup>th</sup>, through March 11<sup>th</sup>, 2023

*Catechesis Notes for the Week* — "Put Not Your Trust In Princes" Much ink has been spilt on the proper relationship between the Christian and the government. It can be a hot topic to talk about. Some argue that good Christians should obey the government no matter what. Others argue good Christians should resist the government whenever the government is doing something that we don't like. And some will argue each of these at different times, depending on who the elected leaders are.

The truth is, the Scriptures are pretty clear concerning our calling as Christians. The trouble is that we often tend to get so caught up in the things of this life that we lose sight of the things eternal. Psalm 146 reminds us, "Put not your trust in princes, in a son of man, in whom there is no salvation. When his breath departs, he returns to the earth; on that very day his plans perish." As Christians, our focus should be on Christ. He alone is our salvation. We do well to not lose sight of the fact that our representatives are neither superheroes or supervillains. They are people. Regular ordinary people who we have elected to represent us. Even the experts who are employed by the government are, at the end of the day, are just "making their best guess."

Does that mean that we are free to ignore governing authorities? Nope. Governing authority is given by God. Like pastors, when someone is a governing authority they occupy an office established by God for our good. Unfortunately, just as with pastors, those people are also full of sin. That is why it is important to pick our leaders with much care and consideration, at least when we are afforded the opportunity to do such. We should also be in constant prayer for our leaders that they look to God's will in guiding their governance. When they fail to heed God's will we pray for their repentance and call them to account. We do not take up arms against them, however. We leave that to God. Yes, sometimes that means we suffer, but such suffering reminds us that our hope is in God alone.

#### The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Though the Lord had brought them out of Egypt, "all the congregation of the people of Israel" grumbled against Him because "there was no water for the people to drink" (Ex. 17:1). Despite their quarreling, the Lord graciously provided for them. He did not strike the people for their sins, but by the hand of Moses He struck the rock instead and brought forth water for the people. In the same way, living water flows from the pierced side of Christ at "about the sixth hour" (John 4:6; 19:14), when He is lifted up on the cross for the sins of the world. He is "the gift of God" (John 4:10), the well from which the Holy Spirit is poured out and becomes in His people "a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (John 4:14). By this grace in which we stand, being at peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, we "worship the Father in spirit and truth" (John 4:23). "We rejoice in hope of the glory of God" because "God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Rom. 5:2, 5)



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
