#### Catechesis Notes for the Week — "Lutheran Confessions"

<u>Article XXI: Worship of the Saints</u> "Our churches teach that the history of saints may be set before us so that we may follow the example of their faith and good works, according to our calling. ...But the Scriptures do not teach that we are to call on the saints or ask the saints for help. Scripture sets before us the one Christ as the Mediator, Atoning Sacrifice, High Priest, and Intercessor."

<u>Article XXII: Both Kinds in the Sacrament</u> In this article the Lutheran reformers argue and give evidence from the Bible and the church fathers as to the practice of giving both the body and blood to the laity. At some point the practice was changed to only give the laity the body while reserving the blood for only the priests. Even in the time of the Reformation they did not quite know where the practice came from. However, it was clear from Scripture and the early Church that Christ gives *both* His body and blood to the proof the people.

<u>Article XXIII: The Marriage of Priests</u> The Lutheran reformers argue that to deny priests marriage is contrary to both Scripture and even previous popes. They argue, along with Christ and Paul, that a contented life of singleness is a gift only God can bestow, since He created us to procreate. Therefore, forcing men without this gift of remaining chase while single has only causes open scandal. Not only that, it is plain that in the Ancient Church priests were married men. It was only around the 1100's in Germany that "for the first time, priests were violently forced to lead a single life." When the decree was first made, they even tore apart marriages of priests who were already married. This went against not only God's Laws, the reformers point out, but even the cannon laws of Rome created by popes and councils.

#### The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

In the same way also He took the cup after supper, and when He had given thanks, He gave it to them, saying: "Drink of it, all of you; this cup is the new testament in My blood, which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. This do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me."

# Looking Forward to "The Second Sunday after Pentecost"

## Service Hymns: Praise Band

## Readings: Hosea 5:15-6:6 | Romans 4:13-25 | Matthew 9:91-13

In calling Matthew the tax collector to follow Him, Jesus demonstrates that He has come "not to call the righteous, but sinners" (Matt. 9:9, 13). As a good physician, He comes not to confirm them in their sins, but to heal them with His grace, calling them to repentance, faith and newness of life (Matt. 9:12). He puts them to death by the preaching of His Law, in order to raise them with His Gospel, to live before Him in the righteousness of His resurrection (Hos. 6:1–2, 5). It is in this way that God "gives life to the dead," that is, through faith in Jesus, "who was delivered up for our trespasses and raised for our justification" (Rom. 4:17, 24–25). Thus, sinners from all nations are called to share the same faith as Abraham, the father of all who trust in Jesus (Rom. 4:16–18). And as our Lord in mercy thus welcomes us poor sinners to recline at the table in His house, so does He "desire steadfast love and not sacrifice" (Matt. 9:10, 13; Hos. 6:6), that we should have mercy on our neighbors and forgive their sins against us for Jesus' sake.



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
