Catechesis Notes for the Week — The Lutheran Confessions, Article XXIV: The Mass

The Lutheran reformers were not seeking to splinter the Church, but rather to rid her of the abuses and corruption that snuck in. This article shows their desire to maintain the wholesome, beneficial, and historic worship practices of the Church. People often say that when they walk into a Roman Catholic congregation and a Lutheran congregation they cannot tell the difference. That is because Lutherans held on to the faithful practiced that were handed down from ancient times. "Nearly all the usual ceremonies are also preserved, except that the parts sung in Latin are interspersed here and there with German hymns." The hymns in the common language were used to not only teach theology, but also to about what was happening in the service. "The people are also advised about the dignity and use of the Sacrament, about how it brings great consolation to anxious consciences, so that they too may learn to believe God and to expect and ask from Him all that is good. This worship pleases God. Such use of the Sacrament nourishes true devotion toward God. Therefore, it does not appear that the Mass is more devoutly celebrated among our adversaries than among us." The Reformers then continue to expose how Rome corrupted the Sacrament, such as charging fees for private Masses to gain wealth. The two falsehoods that arose saying 1. Christ's death forgave original sin, but Mass forgives the sins we commit and 2. simply performing the Mass merits forgiveness for the living or the dead greatly increased these private Masses. This led to more and more corruption, "and in the meantime, trust in Christ and true worship were forgotten." The Lutheran reformers argue, according to Scripture, "the Mass was instituted so that those who use the Sacrament should remember, in faith, the benefits they receive through Christ and how their anxious consciences are cheered and comforted." And so we retain the Mass, the Service of the Sacrament, and offer it whenever the saints gather and there is a desire for it.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate.

Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

- 13. Do you believe, then, that the true body and blood of Christ are in the Sacrament? Yes, I believe it.
- 14. What convinces you to believe this?

The word of Christ: Take, eat, this is My body; drink of it, all of you, this is My blood.

15. What should we do when we eat His body and drink His blood, and in this way receive His pledge?

We should remember and proclaim His death and the shedding of His blood, as He taught us: This do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me.

16. Why should we remember and proclaim His death?

First, so that we may learn to believe that no creature could make satisfaction for our sins. Only Christ, true God and man, could do that. Second, so we may learn to be horrified by our sins, and to regard them as very serious. Third, so we may find joy and comfort in Christ alone, and through faith in Him be saved.

In calling Matthew the tax collector to follow Him, Jesus demonstrates that He has come "not to call the righteous, but sinners" (Matt. 9:9, 13). As a good physician, He comes not to confirm them in their sins, but to heal them with His grace, calling them to repentance, faith and newness of life (Matt. 9:12). He puts them to death by the preaching of His Law, in order to raise them with His Gospel, to live before Him in the righteousness of His resurrection (Hos. 6:1–2, 5). It is in this way that God "gives life to the dead," that is, through faith in Jesus, "who was delivered up for our trespasses and raised for our justification" (Rom. 4:17, 24–25). Thus, sinners from all nations are called to share the same faith as Abraham, the father of all who trust in Jesus (Rom. 4:16–18). And as our Lord in mercy thus welcomes us poor sinners to recline at the table in His house, so does He "desire steadfast love and not sacrifice" (Matt. 9:10, 13; Hos. 6:6), that we should have mercy on our neighbors and forgive their sins against us for Jesus' sake.
