Catechesis Notes for the Week — The Lutheran Confessions, Article XXV: Confession

In our time and place, "private Confession and Absolution" may seem foreign to many Lutherans. Yet the Lutheran reformers never intended for this practice to fall out of favor. They desired to hold tight to this practice, but to rid it of the abuses that crept in. Private Confession and Absolution are a gospel gift, not a work of Law. So when teaching arose turning Confession into an act that merited forgiveness from God the Lutheran Reformers had to address it. "Confession in the churches is not abolished among us. The body of the Lord is not usually given to those who have not been examined and absolved. The people are very carefully taught about faith in the Absolution. Before, there was profound silence about faith. Our people are taught that they should highly prize the Absolution as being God's command. ...They are taught that such faith in Christ truly obtains and receives the forgiveness of sins."

The Lutheran Reformers in the Augsburg Confession also deal with other false teaching, such as needing to name every sin you've committed before you can be forgiven them. "It is impossible to recount all sins, as Psalm 19:12 testifies: 'Who can discern his errors?' Also Jeremiah 17:9, 'The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately sick; who can understand it?' If only sins that can be named are forgiven, consciences could never find peace."

Private Confession and Absolution is such a wonderful gift, especially for those troubled or burned by a particular sin. It is also a proper confession and practice of our Lutheran faith.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate.

Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

CATECHISM — Christian Question with Their Answers —

- 17. What motivated Christ to die and make full payment for your sins?

 His great love for His Father and for me and other sinners, as it is written in John 14;
 Romans 5; Galatians 2; and Ephesians 5.
- 18. Finally, why do you wish to go to the Sacrament?

 That I may learn to believe that Christ, out of great love, died for my sin, and also learn from Him to love God and my neighbor.
- 19. What should admonish and encourage a Christian to receive the Sacrament frequently? First, both the command and the promise of Christ the Lord. Second, his own pressing need, because of which the command, encouragement, and promise are given.
- 20. But what should you do if you are not aware of this need and have no hunger and thirst for the Sacrament?

To such a person no better advice can be given than this: first, he should touch his body to see if he still has flesh and blood. Then he should believe what the Scriptures say of it in Galatians 5 and Romans 7. Second, he should look around to see whether he is still in the world, and remember that there will be no lack of sin and trouble, as the Scriptures say in John 15–16 and in 1 John 2 and 5.

Third, he will certainly have the devil also around him, who with his lying and murdering day and night will let him have no peace, within or without, as the Scriptures picture him in John 8 and 16; 1 Peter 5; Ephesians 6; and 2 Timothy 2.

Note: These questions and answers are no child's play, but are drawn up with great earnestness of purpose by the venerable and devout Dr. Luther for both young and old. Let each one pay attention and consider it a serious matter; for St. Paul writes to the Galatians in chapter six: "Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked."
