Catechesis Notes for the Week — The Lutheran Confessions, Article XXVIII: Church Authority

This article lays out an important doctrine we do well to keep in mind. God has given us two institutions to govern us in this earthly life: the Church and the State. They each have their own distinct role to play. The State is the bearer of God's sword and the Church is the bearer of God's Word. Many times the distinction between them have been blurred as in this fallen world they have come into competition. It never ends well when we try to blend or confuse these two institutions, in our day nor in the reformers'.

"There has been great controversy about the power of the bishops, in which some have terribly confused the power of the Church with the power of the State." The popes covered over the Gospel with human works and traditions, burdening consciences, then amassed political power for earthly might. "Therefore, our teachers, in order to comfort people's consciences, were constrained to show the difference between the authority of the Church and the authority of the State. They taught that both of them are to be held in reverence and honor, as God's chief blessings on earth, because they have God's command."

"The authority of [the Church] is exercised only by teaching or preaching the Gospel and administering the Sacraments, either to many or to individuals, according to their calling. ...Therefore, the Church has the authority to grant eternal things and exercise this authority only by the ministry of the Word. ...Civil rulers do not defend minds, but bodies and bodily things against obvious injuries. They restrain people with the sword and physical punishment in order to preserve civil justice and peace."

"Therefore, the Church's authority and the State's authority must not be confused." Of course, this does not mean the Church and the State shouldn't work together. Both are given for the purposes of God. Both are His instruments. Sometimes the Church needs to confront the government when it has gone astray. Sometimes the government needs to confront the Church. However, cooperation should never become confusion. Every time in history this has happened the Gospel gets covered over, no matter who is "on top," even the Church. So we pray and seek that both the Church and the State fulfill their own duties according to the office that God has given them.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate.

Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

CATECHISM — Basic Questions

What are the two great doctrines of the Bible?

Law and Gospel are the two great doctrines of the Bible. We must sharply distinguish between the Law and the Gospel in order to understand the Bible rightly.

What is the difference between the Law and the Gospel?

The Law teaches what we are to do and not to do; the Gospel teaches what God has done, and still does, in Jesus, for our salvation.

The Law shows us our sin and the wrath of God; the Gospel shows us our Savior and brings God's grace and favor.

The Law must be proclaimed to all people, but especially to sinners who refuse to repent; the Gospel must be proclaimed to sinners who are troubled by their sins.

Romans 3:20; John 6:63; Romans 1:16

What is the Small Catechism?

For centuries, Christians have used three important texts as a basic summary for teaching the Christian faith and life: the Ten Commandments, Creed, and Lord's Prayer. Martin Luther helpfully included biblical passages on Baptism, Confession, and the Lord's Supper. The Small Catechism was written by Luther in 1529, includes these texts along with brief explanations.

Looking Forward to "The Seventh Sunday after Pentecost"

<u>July 16, 2023</u>

Readings: Isaiah 55:10–13 | Romans 8:12–17 | Matthew 13:1–9, 18–23

As "the rain and the snow come down from heaven" and "water the earth, making it bring forth and sprout" (Is. 55:10), so the Word of God accomplishes the purpose for which He speaks it, granting joy and peace through the forgiveness of sins and producing the fruits of faith and love in those who are called by His name. Christ Jesus, the incarnate Word, has established the name of the Lord as "an everlasting sign that shall not be cut off" (Is. 55:13). He opens our ears to hear, our minds to understand and our hearts to believe His Word, lest the evil one come and snatch it away. He thus transforms our rocky hearts into good soil, which clings to the Gospel and "indeed bears fruit" (Matt. 13:23). He is Himself the firstfruits of all who "have received the Spirit of adoption as sons" (Rom. 8:15). Thus being "led by the Spirit of God," we are not afraid, but we cry out in faith to our Father in heaven (Rom. 8:14–15). For as we suffer with Christ, the beloved Son, so shall we "also be glorified with him" (Rom. 8:17).
