

For the week of The Eighth Sunday after Pentecost July 23rd, through July 29th, 2023

Notes for the Week — The Parable of the Wheat and Weeds, Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43

Last week, we noted Matthew 13 is a turning point in Jesus' ministry. Two groups emerge in response to Jesus: those who receive Him and His word and those who don't. The parables sift these groups. His first parable, of the Sower, speaks to why some reject His Word (Satan, the sinful flesh, and the world) and their resulting barrenness. Yet those who receive the mysteries of the Kingdom in Jesus increase in their fruitfulness for an abundant harvest.

The next parable he speaks is of the Wheat and Weeds. The Son of Man plants a good crop, the sons of the kingdom in the field. Along comes his enemy, the devil, who sowed weeds, the sons of the evil one, among the wheat. As it is spoken to the crowd, Jesus emphasizes the coexistence of the wheat and the weeds until the time of harvest. It would only be then that the two would be separated, the wheat gathered to the barn and the weeds thrown into the fire. But when Jesus explains the parable to his disciples, he shifts the emphasis to that final day. "The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will gather out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all law-breakers, and throw them into the fiery furnace. ...Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father."

What are we to make of this apparent shift in the parable? Add to this that Jesus equates the field to the world in his explanation, yet he says at the beginning it is about the kingdom of heaven. And again, at the end of his explanation he says the angels will gather out of his kingdom all sources of evil. With this in mind we see two layers of meaning emerge from Jesus' own words.

When he speaks to the crowd, Jesus is speaking judgement as a word of warning. He is trying to subvert opposition to His Word. Jesus does not delight in the death of a sinner, but they are "sons of the evil one" and will share in his fate if they persist. So they should not seek after someone else, even if Jesus doesn't meet their expectation or desire. He alone is the harbinger of the kingdom.

When he speaks to the disciples, on the other hand, he speaks a word of hope and promise. As Jesus brings the kingdom, Satan is close at hand sowing evil. Jesus knows that for a whole host of reasons it is getting harder for the disciples to follow him. As they look around them, the world continues to reject Jesus. The world puts pressure on them to reject Jesus too. Even their sinful flesh desires to turn them from Jesus. Things just don't seem to be "going their way," and it wearies them. But Jesus assures them that He is the Son of Man, the One who comes in power. But right now, He comes in power to sow, to plant, to nourish, to save. However, at the right time the harvest will come. On that day, all they have waited for will occur. Their hope will not have been in vain.

So persist in hope. Jesus is faithful. He will do it. Amen.

<u>Looking Forward to "The Ninth Sunday after Pentecost"</u>

July 30, 2023

Readings: Deuteronomy 7:6–9 | Romans 8:28-39 | Matthew 13:44-52

The Lord our God has chosen us to be "his treasured possession," not because of any strength in us, but solely "because the LORD loves" us (Deut. 7:6–8). He is faithful, and He "keeps covenant and steadfast love with those who love him and keep his commandments" (Deut. 7:9). He has searched for us and found us in love, and He has bestowed on us "great value" by the great price that He has paid on the cross (Matt. 13:45–46). In His joy, He has redeemed us by His cross and gathered us into His kingdom by the Gospel. Now we are "hidden in a field," covered by the cross and subject to the persecution of the world (Matt. 13:44), not for destruction, but "to be conformed to the image of his Son" (Rom. 8:29). Since we "are called according to his purpose" (Rom. 8:28), and because Christ Jesus died, rose again and lives to intercede for us "at the right hand of God" (Rom. 8:34), there is nothing in all creation that can separate us from "the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. 8:39).
