# For the week of The Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost August 13<sup>th</sup>, through August 19<sup>th</sup>, 2023

#### Notes for the Week — Perilous Peter Matthew 14:22-23

After the crowds are satisfied and sent away, Jesus finally does what He went out in the wilderness to do. Having sent the disciples across the sea, Jesus prayed alone. When He was done, the disciples were a way off so Jesus walked to them upon the sea. But His appearance frightened them. They assumed He must be some apparition because no human could walk upon the water. And they are right, no human could walk upon the water. But Jesus responded to their fear by revealing Himself to them: "Take heart; it is I. Do not be afraid."

Yet there was a problem. Not everyone believed Jesus at His Word. Peter responded "Lord, *if it is you*, command me to come to you on the water." Peter was not responding in great faith. Instead of trusting Jesus, Peter decided to put Him to the test. He just could not comprehend how Jesus could possibly be there on the water.

How often are we like Peter? How often do we simply not trust Jesus at His Word? How often do we convince ourselves that Jesus simply could not do such great things? And so we doubt. We give in to our fear. We decide to take things into our own hands and test God, "If it is you, Jesus, if you really are who you say that you are, then..." No wonder we often have such trouble resting in His peace.

Yet even when we test Him, He appeases us. Jesus looked at Peter and said, "Come." So Peter planted one foot after another firmly upon the water and began walking to Jesus. Get this, no human can walk upon the water. Only God could do such a thing, and here we see Jesus walking on the water. But then something miraculous happens. Jesus gives Peter the ability to walk on the water! But Peter soon falters. Why? Because He is not God. So he turns to Jesus and cries out "Lord, save me!" as he disappears beneath the waves.

Finally Peter confesses what he doubted before. All it took was nearly drowning for Peter to recognize that it is in fact Jesus. It's almost as if Jesus is telling Peter, "You should have trusted me and simply stay in the boat. You are not able, but I am able." Jesus continues to remind us of the same. We don't want God to be our Savior, rather we want to be God to do it all ourselves. But there is a problem...we aren't God. And unfortunately for us, sometime God humors us when we try to be Him. But He does so with a specific purpose in mind: for us to turn and cry out, "Lord, save me!"

And when we feel ourselves falling and we cry out to Him, He always answers. He always saves. Because that is who He is. He is our Savior. He redeems us from sin and death, even without us crying out to Him. So how much more then can we be confidence that Jesus will save us, even from ourselves, when we turn and ask. "Take heart; it is I. Do not be afraid." Amen.

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

## Looking Forward to "The Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost"

<u>August 20, 2023</u>

Readings: Isaiah 56:1, 6-8 | Romans 11:1-2a, 13-15, 28-32 | Matthew 15:21-28

By her persistent prayer that Jesus would have mercy and help her (Matt. 15:22, 24), and even in the face of His initial silence and apparent rejection (Matt. 15:23–26), the Canaanite woman boldly confessed her faith in Him (Matt. 15:27–28). Her beautiful example encourages us to cling to the words and promises of the Gospel, even in the face of the Law that accuses and condemns us. "For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable" (Rom. 11:29), and His Law "has consigned all to disobedience" for the very purpose "that he may have mercy on all" (Rom. 11:32). Hence, the woman's faith and hope were not disappointed, but her prayers were answered in the mercy of Christ. Not only does He grant us the crumbs from His table, but He also feeds us with "the children's bread" in the house of His Father (Matt. 15:26–27). He has brought us to His "holy mountain," and He makes us joyful in His house, where He hears our prayers and accepts our sacrifice of praise upon the altar of His cross (Is. 56:7).
