

For the week of Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost August 27th through September 2nd, 2023

Notes for the Week — On This Rock, Matthew 15:21-26

And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

This is such an amazing, grace-filled moment. Jesus asked his disciples who others say that He is and the answers are all over the board. But then He asks who they say that He is, and Peter, speaking on behalf of the disciples, proclaims, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God."

We can get so used to confessing this mystery that we don't ponder it. But take a moment to consider, many who adhere to the Jewish faith reject Jesus simply because they refuse to believe God would ever come in human flesh. I have heard a well-known Jew admit that there is nothing in the Scripture that would exclude God coming as a man, but the Jewish Talmud, the authoritative traditions and teachings of Rabbinic Judaism, leaves no room for such a possibility. Why? Because the idea that a transcendent God would condescend Himself to become man is simply too much. In other words, "He just wouldn't."

I agree. The idea of God becoming man is simply too much to believe. That is why Jesus declared to Peter, "flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven." For all who want to focus this passage on Peter, Jesus is clear. The rock upon which the church is built is not the person or even office Peter. And if it is in the office of Peter, it is only in the office as one who receives and confesses the true faith of Christ as revealed to him by the Father.

That revelation and confession is what the Church is founded upon, and that revelation and confession of who Jesus is cannot become by all the might and terror of hell. Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God, and all the power and schemes of hell can only flee from His presence. And that same revelation, which led Jesus to declare Peter blessed, is given to you and me. As we receive, believe, and confess this revelation from the Father, that Jesus is the Christ, God's own Son, then we can hear those same words spoken to us from the lips of Jesus, "Blessed are you!" And you are truly blessed by Jesus because you are made to be His own, the one from whom all hell must flee! Thanks be to God!

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Looking Forward to "The Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost"

<u>September 3, 2023</u>

Readings: Jeremiah 15:15-21 | Romans 112:8-21 | Matthew 16:21-28

After St. Peter confessed that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God, our Lord "began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things from the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised" (Matt. 16:21). Upon hearing this "theology of the cross," Simon Peter stumbled into a satanic "theology of glory." But the glory of God is revealed in the Passion and cross of His incarnate Son. The faithful prophets, such as Jeremiah, suffered persecution and rejection in anticipation of Jesus' cross. Yet the Lord did not abandon them; He remembered them, and He was with them to deliver them (Jer. 15:15–20). By His cross, Jesus has redeemed the world, and in His resurrection, He has vindicated all who trust in Him. Thus, the Christian life is a discipleship of self-sacrificing love. Since Christ Jesus has reconciled us to God, we "live peaceably with all" (Rom. 12:18). By the certainty of His cross and resurrection, we "rejoice in hope," and we are "patient in tribulation" and "constant in prayer" (Rom. 12:12)
